DISCLAIMER: As a rideshare driver, when engaging in conversations and/or negotiations with riders, please be mindful to adhere to all rideshare company policies, terms and conditions in addition to driver addendums, legal guidelines and best practices.

During Ride:

1. If chatty:
 - Keep topics neutral
 - Ask about their day
 - Share local knowledge if asked
2. If quiet:
 - Confirm route preference
 - Adjust temperature if needed
 - Focus on smooth driving

End of Ride:

- Thank them for riding
- Wish them a good day
- Remember to rate passenger
- Clean car immediately after
